

Graduation Plans

Students should plan to graduate on the Distinguished Level of Achievement on the Foundation High School Programs with at least one Endorsement. Students should take rigorous coursework in order to be prepared for their next endeavor.

*All students shall enroll in the courses necessary to complete the curriculum requirements for the Foundation High School Program with an endorsement and the Distinguished Level of Achievement. A student, the student’s parent or other persons standing in parental relation to the student, school counselor, and school administrator can agree that the students should be permitted to graduate on the Foundation High School Program without an endorsement. In order to graduate under the Foundation High School Program without an endorsement, the student must receive a copy of *The Benefits of the*

Foundation High School Program with an Endorsement and sign a *Foundation High Endorsement Opt-Out Agreement* with the school administrator and a parent/guardian. A copy is kept in the student’s permanent record folder upon graduation.

****Qualification for Automatic Admission to Texas public colleges and universities requires a student to complete the Distinguished Level of Achievement of the Foundation High School Program. Students will not be eligible for Automatic Admission if they are in the top 10% of their class and are not on the Distinguished Level of Achievement**

Benefits of Graduating under the Foundation High School Program with an Endorsement

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| <ul style="list-style-type: none">• <i>College readiness</i> - Many colleges and universities minimally require the FHSP with an endorsement for admission. In addition, students ranked in the top 10 percent of their graduating classes from an accredited Texas public high school are eligible for automatic admission to most Texas public universities if they have completed the Distinguished Level of Achievement. The University of Texas at Austin is an exception to the top 10% rule as it will automatically admit all eligible 2019 summer/fall freshman applicants who rank in the top 6% of their high school graduating class, with the remaining spots to be filled through holistic review. | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• <i>Recognition</i> - The Foundation High School Program seal will be affixed to the Academic Achievement Record (AAR), or transcript, of students graduating under the FHSP. The Endorsement will be affixed to the transcript upon graduation.• <i>Test results</i> - Research suggests that students who take additional English, math, social studies, and science courses make higher scores on the SAT® or ACT® college entrance exams. The Distinguished Level of Achievement requires four credits in each of these core subject areas. |
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State & Local Limits Apply: Students must be aware of graduation requirements

There are several special restrictions of which students should be aware. Some of these are state requirements, and some are local policy. The state requires only one credit of PE to graduate. Students can count up to no more than 4 credits of PE or athletics toward graduation. Therefore, a student who participates in athletics all 4 years can count all 4 credits toward the state graduation requirement.

Local credit courses-do not count toward graduation requirements.

It is the student's responsibility to know what credits are needed for graduation and requirements for college admissions. They are encouraged to seek assistance from their high school counselor if they have any questions about any of the graduation plans.

State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR) End-of-Course Exams Required for Graduation

Students must successfully pass the State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR) in order to graduate. STAAR requires students to successfully complete 5 End-of-Course (EOC) assessments.

There are some substitute exams for EOC for graduation. Please see your counselor for more details.

The STAAR EOC assessments are required for the following subjects:

- Algebra I
- English I
- English II
- Biology
- U.S. History

Notes:

1. College Board Advanced Placement and Advanced (formerly Pre-AP) courses may be substituted for requirements in appropriate areas. Please refer to each course section as some AP classes are core electives.
2. Students are expected to graduate under the Foundation High School Program with at least one endorsement.
3. **A student cannot repeat a completed course for credit. If a student completes a course for which she/he has already gained credit, the repeat course will not count towards graduation.**
4. Students who cannot physically participate in PE for credit due to a disability or other documented reason can substitute 1.0 academic elective, with permission from the campus or district committee or the high school academic dean. Documentation must be kept and placed in the student's permanent records folder upon graduation. There must be a medical waiver signed by a physician. There are other PE online courses a student can take.
5. A student cannot combine a half credit of a course for which there is an EOC assessment with another elective credit to satisfy an elective credit requirement.
6. All students shall enroll in the courses necessary to complete the curriculum requirements for the Foundation High School Program with an Endorsement. If the student, the student's parent or other persons standing in parental relation to the student, and school counselor or school administrator agree that the student should be allowed to graduate without an endorsement, parents and students receive a copy of the *Benefits of the Foundation High School Program with Endorsement* and a signed copy of the *Foundation High School Program Endorsement Opt-Out Agreement*. Foundation High School Program Endorsement Opt-Out Agreement will be filed in the student's permanent record folder. Graduation requirements cannot be waived under any conditions. Courses can be individualized and modified for students based on ARD committee decisions. Students graduating under the Foundation Graduation Program without an Endorsement should have 22 state credits.
7. State HB 5 requires students maintain a Personal Graduation Plan (4 year plan) throughout high school. 7th and 8th grade students should name an Endorsement and complete their PGP before they enter 10th grade in high school. Parents and students must be given the opportunity for an individual conference. When a student takes a course that is not a part of their graduation program or endorsement plan, the parents must be notified.
